This fall HRB will bid a fond farewell to our Fundraising and Communications Manager, Penny Lamping, as she retires after 25 years of tireless work - first as a dedicated Board member and later as a staff member defined by her passionate and relentless advocacy for affordable housing. Penny first joined the HRB Board in 1995, after playing integral role in the de-

sign and development of HRB's Village Home apartments. Said Penny of the experience, "it made clear to me the benefits of having a diversity of housing options on the island and I knew I wanted to be a part of that effort."

In joining the Board of Directors, Penny brought her enthusiasm and experience as a life-long Islander to advance HRB's mission and expand its service to the community. She and her husband, Tom, raised their two children in Penny's childhood home in Crystal Springs and have witnessed the evolution of their hometown over the years. That lens has always informed Penny's work and continues as a source of inspiration for the fight to make Bainbridge Island a place that is open and welcome to all.

After over 11 years on the Board of Directors, Penny joined the Staff as HRB's Property and Office Manager. She immediately set out to work with the households that reside at HRB properties as well as the hundreds of individuals who contact HRB each year for housing and home finding assistance. Most recently, Penny transitioned into the roles of fundraising and communications with the same vigor and energy she brought to past endeavors.

Each year, Penny has planned and led HRB's Annual Fundraising Breakfast and has sought out speakers and messages that are perfectly suited to the time and moment. In 2019, after hearing a NPR news story about a City Manager in California who resigned over his City Council's lack of support for an affordable housing project, Penny tracked down the individual and shared our story. Soon after speaking with Penny, Steven Falk had accepted an invitation to travel from the Bay Area to Bainbridge Island as the keynote speaker for the Annual Breakfast.

Under her leadership, Penny has more than doubled HRB's fundraising capacity and donor base and she was a key leader in our organization's efforts to secure funding to purchase the 550 Madison Avenue property in 2019. Indeed, Penny is absolutely fearless when it comes to setting out to accomplish whatever task is before her - she will call, send emails, visit in person with any individual she thinks can help HRB with its message and work.

In early August, we welcomed our newest residents to the HRB community as Erika and her two children signed a lease for one of our apartment homes. After needing to relocate to Port Orchard. Erika was thrilled to be able to return home to Bainbridge Island and allow her children to finish off their school careers among friends and family.

Amidst a year defined by the pandemic and the protests demanding racial justice, it can be difficult to feel hopeful. And yet, in hearing Erika describe the impact that safe and affordable housing will have on her family's life, we at HRB have found it just a bit easier to look for those moments of happiness.

At HRB, our Staff and Board have spent much of 2020 redoubling our efforts to live out our mission in the community by providing and maintaining affordable housing on Bainbridge Island. Thanks to the generosity of the Bainbridge Community Foundation and countless other donors, we have been able to offer rental assistance to dozens of individuals and families that have been impacted by the pandemic. Our commitment to our residents ensures that safe and stable housing can be a cornerstone in our community's recovery.

We are also committed to adding more homes to our community land trust and are currently on track to make two single-family homes available to our wait list in early 2021. The addition of these two homes

is part of our organization's larger goal of identifying residences across the island that are suitable for affordable home ownership. HRB's Independent Living Program has also continued to offer informational sessions about fall prevention and where safely possible, coordinated home improvements for seniors and individuals with disabilities.

nization's Fund Development Director. As a public health professor, I teach 20-year olds about wage disparities that existed long before the Covid-19 pandemic. The workers we consider essential – those in child care, food production, construction, transportation, health care, the service industry, grocery stores, teachers, and school staff – tend to earn lower wages and have been hit especially hard with pandemic-related job loss.

The starkest consequence of lost wages is decreased access to stable housing. We know that being without a stable and affordable home makes us sicker, harms our mental health, and leads to earlier death. Even children who experience housing instability in utero are more likely to suffer worse health than their peers.

Now more than ever we get to rally as a community and show our true colors. We are thinking creatively about how to support our small businesses, our restaurants, our farms, and our schools that employ people who want to remain on Bainbridge Island.

Thank you for your support of Housing Resources Bainbridge while we weather together the latest threat to affordable housing.

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
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
